Our section represents over 300 Canadian fisheries professionals, including scientists, fisheries managers, consultants, students and representatives from public, private, and non-for-profit sectors.

The Canadian Aquatic Resources Section wishes to express our support for your plans to review recent changes to the *Fisheries Act*, restore lost protections, and incorporate modern safeguards. Our fisheries are an integral part of Canada's economy and culture, and we support all efforts to protect and restore them. As professionals who interact with colleagues around the globe, we know that the *Fisheries Act* and associated habitat policies and management activities conducted by Fisheries and Oceans Canada were once seen as a global model for fisheries conservation. The proposed review provides an excellent opportunity to reclaim this global leadership while protecting and enhancing our natural resource. It also provides an opportunity to identify which recent changes were beneficial, which require amending, and what new regulatory tools or approaches could be added to the Act with the goal of protecting and restoring freshwater and marine fish habitat. Canadians derive many benefits from conserving our fisheries and the habitat that sustains them. Healthy waters are of great importance to the social and economic well-being of Canadian society and the protection of fish habitat is an important part of ensuring abundant aquatic resources for future generations.
