The memorable AFS meeting held in Anchorage last September is still fresh in my mind, as I begin organizing upcoming Section activities for this September's meeting in Lake Placid, New York. The Section will be sponsoring two symposia at that meeting, which are described briefly in this newsletter. Please plan to support the Section by attending one or both of these sessions if you travel to Lake Placid!

At this year's Section meeting we will announce the winners of the Section's Wright and Phelps awards. A final reminder: Wright award applications for support of graduate student travel to the annual meeting are due **May 15**. The Phelps committee has reached its decision on this year's award winner, which I will announce at our Section meeting. I'll post the details for this meeting in the Section's summer newsletter.

Several interesting conferences are coming up this month and next (see the Calendar of Upcoming Events for particulars, deadlines, and website information). For example, the annual meeting of the Society for Molecular Biology and Evolution: Genomes, Evolution, & Bioinformatics (GEB2006) will be held May 24-28 at Arizona State University in Tempe, Arizona. This year's Coastwide Salmonid Genetics Meeting will be held June 22-24 in Santa Cruz, California. (A relatively small meeting, the Coastwide has met every couple of years on the Pacific coast for the last twenty or so years, and is a favorite of graduate students). Evolution 2006, the joint meeting of the American Society of Naturalists, the Society of Systematic Biologists and the Society for the Study of Evolution, will be going on June 23-27 at the State University of New York at Stony Brook, New York. The

20th annual meeting of the Society for Conservation Biology, Conservation Without Borders, will be held June 24-28 in San Jose, California. The IX International Symposium for Genetics in Aquaculture, held every few years, will occur this year from June 25-30 in Montpellier, France. If you can afford to travel to one of these meetings, you probably already know that it can be very difficult to choose from among them.

Finally, a plea to all Section members: Please take time to vote in the upcoming election for new officers. We will be sending ballots and candidate information to you very soon.

Applications Due Monday! Genetics Section Graduate Award in Memory of James E. Wright

The Genetics Section of the American Fisheries Society is pleased to announce the James E. Wright Graduate Award. This award is presented annually at the Genetics Section meeting at the AFS Annual Meeting and is intended to recognize excellence in graduate-level work in fisheries genetics and to assist graduate students with travel to the national meeting. The amount of the award for travel to the 2006 annual meeting in Lake Placid, New York is anticipated to be \$400.00. All graduate students are encouraged to apply.

Selection will be based on the following criteria:

- 1. Potential for success in research in fisheries genetics (60%)
- 2. Anticipated contribution to upcoming annual meeting, e.g. paper, poster, or other contribution (20%)
- 3. Service to the Society, its Sections, or Chapters (10%)
- 4. Demonstrated need for travel assistance (10%)

Application Procedure:

- 1. Applicant must be a full or affiliate member of the Genetics Section at the time of application.
- 2. Application package should include:
- a. A brief curriculum vitae including anticipated degree, date of completion, and career goals
- b. A statement of the thesis or dissertation and abstract of progress to date
- c. The names and addresses of two references familiar with the applicant's background and abilities.
- d. A statement of previous service to the Society, its Sections, or Chapters, and need for travel assistance.
- e. A statement addressing anticipated contribution to the upcoming annual meeting.

Deadline for application is: May 15, 2006

AFS GS Symposium on Hybridization

"The Role of Hybridization in Evolution, Ecology, and Conservation of Fishes"

Hybridization has important implications for management, conservation, and evolution of fishes. Hybridization can be harmful when it erodes the genetic distinctiveness between species or reduces the frequency of adaptive phenotypes, sometimes leading to the extinction of species with relatively small population

Human activities, including stock transfer, habitat alteration, and exploitation may increase the incidence of hybridization, although the magnitudes of these effects are hard to quantify. The presence of hybrids also complicates management decisions and legislation. Hybridization can also be a natural component of the evolution of fish communities by fostering the exchange of genes among nascent species that are not fully reproductively isolated and may also result in the evolution of new species. In this symposium we will seek to bring together experts from a variety of disciplines including genetics, morphology, management, and conservation to discuss the impacts of hybridization on natural populations of fishes. Topics for discussion include the detection of hybridization and identification of hybrids using molecular and morphological tools, the impact of hybridization on endangered species and endangered species policies, strategies for preserving the genetic integrity of native fishes through elimination of hybrids and non-native fishes, the role of hybridization in the evolution and speciation of fishes, and case studies of the management practices and roles that natural and manmade hybrid fishes play in aquatic ecosystems.

AFS GS Symposium on Trout & Char

"Risks to Migratory Life Histories of Trout and Char: a Call for Research, Assessment and Conservation"

Many species of trout and char express life history forms that exploit different habitats over the life cycle of the animal. These habitats range from headwater tributaries to estuaries or oceans. The expression of life history variation in these organisms reflects complex interactions between the environment and genetics. Life history models are increasingly powerful in predicting life history trajectories. At the same time, technological tools are being developed that reveal complex patterns

and causes of migration that were not apparent in earlier research. Yet the declines in migratory life history forms may be outpacing our technological advances. In some instances migratory forms are extinct and resident forms persist, leaving society with the impression that populations or species of trout or char are not at risk and may not warrant special protection. Resident populations of trout and char are not continually challenged with the rigors of migration lessening selective pressures for that trait. Thus, if migratory forms of trout and char become extirpated their non-migratory counterparts may have an uncertain legacy in terms of future adaptive traits. Goals of this session are to:

- 1. present recent research on our understanding of life history complexity in trout and char,
- 2. document the unique risks to and the loss of migratory life history forms of these species, and
- 3. present potential conservation and assessment approaches for migratory forms of trout and char.

Symposium Announcement:

The Invasive Asian Carps in North America: A Forum to Understand the Biology and Manage the Problem

August 22-23, 2006, Peoria, IL

Bighead, black, silver and grass carps are large fishes native to Asia. They are considered invasive in the United States, and undesirable effects on native species are expected. Bighead and silver carps, especially, have become extremely abundant in the large rivers of the central United States, especially in the vicinity of Peoria, IL, where this symposium is located. Black and grass carp also have a high potential for becoming nuisance species because of their efficient and specialized feeding strategies. This conference is designed to provide continuing and public education on the biology of Asian carps, and to provide a forum for advancement of the most recent information on Asian carp management and control.

You are invited to submit a paper or poster on biological research, modeling, or education/outreach efforts related to the following topics:

- Prevention of new carp introductions
- Containment
- Control of existing feral populations including market development
- Minimization of adverse impacts

Platform presentations: Presentations will last 15 minutes with an additional 5 minutes allowed for questions and will be grouped in a logical order within the conference. Posters: maximum size 3' X 6'. We have a large space for posters and encourage your participation in a special poster session on the evening of Aug 22nd. You may have a poster in addition to a paper. Presenters of platform presentations or posters must pay the normal registration fee. After abstracts are submitted and selected, publication of a proceedings will be considered. Presenters should indicate if they desire publication in that proceedings. If a proceedings is generated, published papers must undergo peer review.
