The Professional Fisheries Association of New York held a meeting at the Holiday Inn. Rome. New York on October 4, 1966. President John Gould called the meeting to order at 8:20 P.M.

Committee on Professional Standards. Chairman Bill Bentley gave an informal report on the thoughts of his committee. It was their feeling that all persons should be included, that this organization should have professional standards and recognition from these standards. There was general discussion from the floor. Howard Loeb moved that the Professional Standards Committee be carried forward and charged with the responsibility of drawing up a schedule of professional standards. The motion was seconded by Eli Dietsch. Carried.

Committee on Joint Annual Meeting. Chairman Robert Zilliox reported that contact with the Wildlife and Forestry groups indicated that they were interested in a joint meeting. President John Gould proposed that this committee be continued to further investigate the possibility of joint meetings and report at the February meeting.

Program Committee. In the absence of Chairman Earl Stiles, Bill Bentley expressed the committee feelings that the P.F.A.M.Y. meetings would serve as a good reviewing group for papers which might be presented at other society meetings.

In general discussion Bill Bentley said the state would try to continue to aid by paying expenses at these meetings. Joint meetings would have advantages in this respect.

There was a general group consensus that P.F.A.N.Y. should move forward.

A motion was made by Bill Bentley that the Committee on Joint Annual Meeting serve as a delegation from this group to attend the Wildlife and Forestry Societies meetings. Seconded by Jim Lindsey and earried.

Jim Lindsey moved the meeting be adjourned. Carried. Meeting adjourned at 10:00 P.M.

Minutes of the Annual Meeting

New York Chapter of the American Fisheries Society 6 December, 1968, Holiday Inn. Syracuse, N.Y.

- The meeting was called to order at 5:25 PM by President 1. Udell Stone. A moment of silent prayer was observed in memory of Robert Zilliox. No guests were attending the meeting. A quorum was present. President Stone stated that the New York Chapter had been officially accepted by the American Fisheries Society. He also stated that the Chapter President should attend the meeting of the Northeastern Division of the American Fisheries Society in White Sulfur Springs, West Virginia in February. It was noted that a motion presented at the 29 March, 1968 meeting of the New York Chapter, which passed unanimously, stated that the Chapter would pay expenses of one officer in the event that none received Conservation Department approval to attend the meeting of the Northeastern Division. President Stone commented on the good quality of the program at the Joint Meeting of the New York Chapters of the American Fisheries Society and the Wildlife Society.
- 2. Adoption of the minutes of the 29 March, 1968 meeting was moved by William Bentley and passed.
- 3. The Treasurer's report was read by President Stone in the absence of Paul Maynard. Russell Fieldhouse, Chairman of the Auditing Committee, stated that the Treasurer's records were examined and were acceptable.
- 4. Report of Committees
 - a) Richard Schaefer, Chairman of the Program Committee, reported that the \$3.00 registration fee covered the cost of speakers and coffee. He stated that he felt the \$2.00 membership dues were inadequate in view of current costs. He thanked committee members for their assistance.
 - b) William Flick, Chairman of the Membership Committee, reported that attempts had been made to ferret out other workers in the field. Forty colleges and universities in the state were contacted, but the response was disappointing. Mimeographed notices were also sent to individuals, e.g. consulting biologists.

- 6. Unfinished business
 Richard Schaefer asked if it were necessary to be a member of
 the American Fisheries Society to be a voting member of the New
 York Chapter. William Flick answered yes.
- 7. New business William Flick commented on the need to send the New York Fish News to other than chapter members, e.g. Conservation Officers and Game Biologists. William Bentley stated that he approves of increasing the mailing list to include certain colleges and universities where interest prevails and Conservation Officers. He suggested better use of the Fish News insofar as passing the copy on to others in the department is concerned. Other suggestions were offered about the way in which increased mailing should be handled. A motion was presented that the possibility be explored of sending the New York Fish News to Conservation Officers and offices of the Bureau of Game. It passed, but William Bentley questioned the correctness of the New York Chapter interfering in the decision of the New York State Conservation Department. This motion was then corrected to state that the Secretary of the chapter send a letter to the Division of Fish and Game encouraging wider distribution of the New York Fish News to Conservation Officers and offices of the Bureau of Game.

William Bentley proposed that lapel pins be sold at a profit to add to the treasury.

Dan Plosila mentioned financial difficulties of the chapter and suggested a raise in dues.

8. John Gould, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, presented the following slate of officers:

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NEW YORK CHAPTER OF THE AMERICAN FISHERIES SOCIETY ITHACA, NEW YORK 29 MARCH, 1968

A meeting of the New York Chapter was held at Ives Hall, Cornell University on 29 March, 1968. The meeting was called to order by President Stone at 4 P.M. A quorum was present.

President Stone announced that chapter petition by the Professional Fisheries Association of New York was accepted by the American Fisheries Society. Membership in the American Fisheries Society is required to be a voting member of a chapter.

The minutes of the meeting on 8 December, 1967 were read and accepted.

Treasurer Maynard reported on the finances of the chapter to date. His report was accepted.

President Stone distributed current committee lists, and Treasurer Maynard reported that a membership list had been forwarded to the Executive Committee. Copies of the membership list are available from the treasurer.

President Stone called for committee reports.

Heraldic Committee - Martin Pfeiffer stated that the eyed egg has definitely been rejected. He and William MacGregor are developing new ideas. This prompted a discussion of the name for the chapter. President Stone called for a vote on Professional Fisheries Society of New York vs. New York Chapter of the American Fisheries Society. The majority voted in favor of New York Chapter of the American Fisheries Society.

Membership Committee - Bill Flick reported that the committee would like to seek members from the undergraduate and graduate schools at R.P.I, Plattsburgh, Syracuse University and other colleges offering fishery science. He mentioned that such students might not have enough money for American Fishery Society dues. Because of this, he suggested that the chapter offer an associate membership which would have no voting right, if such an arrangement is agreeable to the American Fisheries Society. Howard Loeb put this suggestion in the form of a motion, and it was seconded. Upon voting, it passed unanimously. Richard Schaefer offered to contact the American Fisheries Society about an associate membership in relation to the societies rules.

Maurice Otis proposed that, a prospectus for new members be prepared. The committee has already given some thought to this, and plans to proceed with such a prospectus.

Old Business - None

New Business - There was a discussion concerning sponsorship of the New York Fish News by the New York Chapter. Jerry LeTendre and Fred Tingle are now editing this. Jerry agreed to investigate sponsorship by the chapter and cost support by the Division of Fish and Game. Bill Pearce offered to find the reaction of the Conservation Department.

It was suggested that the New York Chapter membership list be used for the New York Fish News mailing list.

President Stone reminded the Executive Committee and Program Committee members that they should plan to meet with the same committees of the New York Wildlife Society to plan the joint fall meeting.

Bob Harding presented a motion that the New York Chapter pay expenses of one officer of the chapter in the event that none received Conservation Department approval to attend the Northeast Section Meeting of the American Fisheries Society. It was seconded by Paul Maynard and passed unanimously.

Ted Bell inquired about Executive Committee action in relation to a resolution opposing thermal pollution. President Stone stated that this suggestion will be brought to the attention of the Resolution Committee.

Dr. Alfred Eipper mentioned that copies of reports presented at the Fishery Biologists' Seminar, 27-29 March, 1968, will be mailed to all those who attended. He asked for suggestions of topics for future seminars.

Bill Pearce suggested a possible resolution which should be considered by the Resolutions Committee. This suggestion was concerned with the need for a liaison man to represent the New York Chapter in meetings with state legislative members to discuss fishery programs and salary needs.

Arch Petty moved that the meeting be adjourned. This was seconded and passed unanimously. President Stone adjourned the meeting at 5 P.M.

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William Pearce asked for a round of applause for the Program and Executive Committees.

10. The meeting adjourned at 6:35 PM.

Many thanks are due to past President, Bill Pearce, and the Program Committee in setting up the meeting at Bergamo and coming up with a program that drew 82 members vs. 24 in 1975. Papers were given by Chapter members on their various programs.

1977 Second meeting of the New York Chapter at Bergamo with papers by members on various aquatic projects. President - C. Lavett Smith.

Membership - 109.

There was good attendance at the meeting with much interest and enthusiasm in the Chapter. Along with the regular aquatic related papers there was an excellent session on aquaculture. Secretary-Treasurer Joe Gorsuch did the Chapter a big favor in obtaining bulk mailing rates and addressograph plates for membership mailing.

December - Joint meeting with Wildlife Chapter in Syracuse - Theme - "Communication". President - U. B. Stone. Membership - 110.

Dick Schaefer stated that \$2.00 dues were inadequate to maintain organization.

American Fishery Society accepted PFANY as the New York Chapter American Fishery Society.

1969 <u>December</u> - Meeting of the New York Chapter American Fisheries Society with the Wildlife Chapter - Theme - "The Demands on Our Fish and Wildlife Resources". President - Bill Flick. Membership - 81.

The initial plans for the film "The Aquatic Ecologist" evolved under the Professional Standards Chairmanship of Steve Simkins.

1970 December - Fourth joint meeting with the Wildlife Chapter - Theme - "The Use of Computors in Fisheries and Wildlife Research, Management and Husbandry". President - Paul Neth. Membership - 114.

Howard Loeb was Program Chairman for the Fishery Chapter and it was a better than average joint meeting. Work on the film "The Aquatic Ecologist made real strides. Committee - Chairmen - Steve Simkins, Bill Flick, Dwight Webster, Al Jensen.

1971 December - Fifth joint meeting with the Wildlife Chapter - theme - "The Role of Fish and Wildlife Managers in N.Y.'s Conservation Programs". President - Robert Griffith. Membership - 76.

Work still progressing on film. A major item at the meeting was the problem of "Affiliate" membership category.

The following material has been dug out of various old boxes, torn folders, the backs of envelopes, and parts from foggy memory (or perhaps imagination). New material may eventually appear as members retire and clean out their desks. Until then I hope this chronology* will be an aid in plotting a course for further growth and achievements of the Chapter. We have done well but with the present large, diversified, and young membership we can and should do even better.

1965 March - Fishery COOP Workshop at Cornell - Subject "Age and Growth of Fish." On March 10, 1965 at this meeting John Gould suggested creation of the N.Y. Association of Fishery Biologists.

October - Rome, N.Y. meeting of N.Y. Conservation Department Bureau of Fish - Organizational meeting of Professional Fisheries Association of New York - (Initially N.Y. Association of Fishery Biologists.)

At the meeting the members present agreed nearly unanimously that the advantages inherent in our fisheries group - i.e., the unique opportunities for really productive, searching discussion of fisheries research and management topics of mutual interest by all fisheries workers of the State - would be greatly reduced by changing over to a "joint meeting" arrangement with Wildlife Chapter. (Taken from the records of 1966.)

January - Joint meeting with Wildlife Chapter - "How Does Fish and Wildlife Fit into the New N.Y. Dept. of Environmental Conservation." President - Howard Loeb. Membership - 91.

First Chapter News Letter - Ned Holmes Editor. Last year of N.Y. Fish News (Dept. publication). Work still progressing on film "The Aquatic Ecologist".

1973 February - Seventh annual joint meeting with the Wildlife Chapter - Theme - "Fish and Wildlife Values, Conflict or Concord". President - Martin Pfeiffer. Membership - 97.

For the first time $\frac{1}{2}$ day was devoted to separate sessions. Fisheries subject was "Fish Management Today - Where Do We Go from Here". Film "The Aquatic Ecologist" nearing completion.

January - Eighth annual joint meeting with the Wildlife Chapter - Theme - "Fish & Wildlife in Regional Planning: The Adirondacks and Beyord". President - Bill Pearce. Membership - 74.

Separate Fisheries Session Saturday morning "Role of Forage Fish in Salmonid Management". This was an excellent session with speakers such as N. V. Martin from Ontario. A real bright spot compared to most joint sessions.

Film - "The Aquatic Ecologist" was finally completed. Dave Haselman and Bernie Holtman who produced the film did an excellent job and covered over 10,000 miles gathering material. The College of Forestry at Syracuse contributed the services of Dave and Bernie and the N.Y. Chapter begged, borrowed and pleaded (plus sold some film) to come up with the \$11,500 needed by the end of 1974. Steve Simkins was Committee Chairman through to the end with Dwight Webster and Bill Flick committee members attending all meetings for 6 years. Bob Werner was the super salesman that handled film distribution following completion and collected sale money to get us out of debt.

1975 February - Ninth (and last) joint meeting with the Wildlife Chapter.
Also involved in this meeting were The Soil Conservation Service, and
the N.Y. Upstate Chapter of the American Institute of Planners. Theme
- "Fnvironmental Aspects in Land Use - Preservation vs. Development".
President - Bill Pearce. Membership - 84.

There was very little interest in this meeting (no separate session for fisheries) and total attendance was 24 with 28 needed for a quorum. Officers from the previous year were asked to continue serving.

Film - "The Aquatic Ecologist" received an award for reaching the finals in the American Film Festival. It was also accepted for entry in the "Cine Film Festival". It was selected by the United States Information Agency for use in their Science Reports. A short made from the film was made into 22 languages and sent to 84 countries.


SUBJECT: Local Chapter of the American Fisheries Society

At the 95th American Fisheries Society annual meeting in Portland, Oregon the Constitution of the American Fisheries Society By-Laws were modified by adding Section 24 as follows:

- (a) A local chapter of the Society may be established by the favorable action of the Society upon a petition presented to it at any regular meeting by not less than 10 members in good standing in a particular geographic region within an established Division.
- (b) A local chapter upon receiving approval to be established shall enjoy all the rights, privileges, advantages and responsibilities granted to regional divisions as set forth in Article VI, Paragraphs 1 to 7 inclusive.

A local chapter of the American Fisheries Society can be an organization by local fishery workers with the objective of becoming better acquainted with each other's problems, projects and accomplishments. It can serve as a lifeline from the local level to the Divisional and National level. This would help the parent society to be informed of the desires and thinking of those unable to attend Divisional or National meetings, as well as increase the membership and ultimately the strength of the Society.

SUGGESTED BY-LAWS FOR A CHAPTER, AMERICAN FISHERIES SOCIETY

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The membership of the Chapter shall be composed of those American Fisheries Society members in good standing residing in the _____(AREA)

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The Chapter shall hold at least one meeting annually at a time and place designated by the Executive Committee. The program and presentation of papers shall be the responsibility of the Program Committee.

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The officers of the Chapter shall consist of a President, Vice President, and a Secretary-Treasurer.

Officers shall be elected at the annual meeting. The Secretary-Treasurer may hold office for a period longer than one year, but the term of the other officers shall be one year. In case of a vacated position, the Executive Committee shall appoint a qualified replacement to fill an unexpired term.

Jim Lindsey, Dirck Benson and I held a conference call to prepare the recommendation for action by Executive Committee of the New York Chapter of the Wildlife Society on Bill 81825 - A2556.

We find this bill is substantially improved from that submitted some two years ago. These improvements include deletion of the underlined words: public or private forest lands; and the yields thereof (Pg. 2, line 27) "and properly manage forest land resources" (Pg. 3, line 2). A major addition in accord with our previous chapter resolution was the insertion of "fish biologist or wildlife biologist" as exemptions (Pg. 13, line 7). We were pleased to see these changes.

Our unanimous agreement was that the definition of professional forestry is still too inclusive. In this day of multiple use of wild lands many people have skills useful in managing land and vegetation occupied by "plant associations predominatly of forest trees" (Pg. 2, line 19). It is our feeling that foresters should be most skilled in the management of forest lands for the production of wood products.

It therefore, was our unanimous recommendation that the Executive Committee oppose the bill as it is presently worded.

It was, however, agreed that the insertion on page 3, line 2, of the words "for the production of wood products." (to make it read "...manage forest lands for the production of wood products.") together with the previous alterations make, this bill satisfactory from the standpoint of wildlife workers.

We therefore recommend the Executive Committee support inclusion of the phrase "for the production of wood products." following the words "manage forest land" and support any bill having this more restrictive phraseology.



Dear Mr. Robinson:

In my work as Director of Conservation Research in the League, I am in close touch with Mr. P.A.Douglas, Sport Fishing Institute, Washington, D.C., in or common interest in protecting and conserving our valuable fish and aquatic ecology, and at the moment we are particularly concerned over the sudden influx of modern nuclear electric generating plants; either already built or proposed near the waters of New York State, and our main interest is in thermal pollution that can be so damaging or destructive to our fish and other marine like. In this connection, in 1963, we witnessed a tremendous kill of striped bass and other species at the Indian Point, N.Y. nuclear plant of Con Edelson, that was beyond belief, which we are now convinced was caused by thermal pollution.

We are now faced with a still greater damaging situatation through the introduction of a Bill No. A 6505 which Governor Rockefeller sponsored; had rushed through our Legalslature in its last few days of this session and hastily signed into law, which we consider an extreme menace and which we are demanding be repealed immediately. Copies of our data are enclosed.

Mr. Douglas has suggested that I contact you, for I imagine he feels we may have a common interest in trying to control thermal pollution from such plants, and I would ask that you give this matter your kind attention and hone or me with an early reply.

Atom power plant in hot water

Florida Power & Light's Biscayne Bay facility is under fire from conservationists for threat of thermal pollution. Outcome could affect nuclear plants all around the country

An atomic battle royal is heating up in Greater Miami between conservationists and government officials on the one hand and Florida Power & Light Co. on the other.

The fight revolves around a huge nuclear power plant FPL now has nuclear power plant FPL now has under construction on the shores of Biscayne Bay. In this case, the use of the atom to generate electricity isn't at stake. The issue is what conservationists and other foes of the project term "thermal pollution"—a change in the ecological balance of the bay caused by dumping back into it water that has been used to cool the power plant's condensers. cool the power plant's condensers. The result would be to raise water temperature in some parts of the bay anywhere from 10F to 18F above normal summer temperature of 92F.

No one is willing to predict what the outcome will be. For one thing, there is a luge lack of solid scientific evidence in the field of ecology—the study of mutual relations between organisms and their environment. But, in the words of an Atomic Energy Commission man: "The con-Energy Commission man: Ine conservationists are in a fight to the death on this one. What happens in Miami could affect nuclear power plants all over the U.S."

Remote area. The battle of Biscayne Bay started quietly enough, when FPL ordered two 432,000-kw

turbo generators and two boilers to expand its conventional power plant facility at Cutler, in Dade County. However, because of opposition from local residents, permission to add to the Cutler plant was denied by the Metropolitan Dade County

Commission. FPL engineers—headed by Mc-Gregor Smith, board chairman and himself a conservationist—went look-ing elsewhere. They came up with an 1,800-acre site at Turkey Point, a remote and swampy area 20 mi. south of Cutler, where the nearest residents and farms are 4 mi. distant. Metropolitan Commission granted its permission to operate the two conventional units at Turkey Point. The cost, including transmission, was estimated at \$22-million.

If FPL had let things alone at this point, the controversy would not have arisen. The conventional, oilburning power plant would have required 275,000 gal. per minute of coolant water—hardly enough to stir

up conservationists.

Uproar. But planning for additional power for the growing area and believing that atomic power would be more economical over the long haul, FPL ordered two nuclear units rated at 760,000 kw each.

These will bring the use of condensing water at Turkey Point up to 1.8-million gal. per minute by late 1971, while increasing the temperature of the water radically.

This was the signal for the conservationists to rise in an uproar. Some insist that this volume of hot water will desirent ma-

water will destroy the delicate ma-rine ecology in Biscayne Bay and ruin a unique sub-tropical estuary.

Sounding the nation's troubled waters -

The subject of thermal pollution—and the probable need for quick legislative action—has caught the eye of Senator Edmund S. Muskie (D-Me.).

Last fall, Muskie asked Atomic Energy Commission authorities for their position on regulating thermal discharge from nuclear power plants and learned that AEC claims no authority on the matter—either unthority on the matter-either under its licensing regulations or under an executive order that calls on all government agencies to provide leadership in cutting water pollution.

So Muskie's Public Works subcommittee on air and water pollution has been holding hearings—so far in the states of Maine, Florida, and Vermont, and in Washington, D.C.—and

has discovered:

Little real effort has been made to control waste heat discharge from nuclear plants.

There is almost no specific information available to determine the ecological effects of large-volume hot water dis-

charge from a nuclear facility. What Muskie proposes to do is not yet clear. First he wants to hold more hearings (probably in the Midwest and in the Pa-

Gentlemen

Increases in electric power load demands and further substantial increases anticipated in the immediate future make it absolutely essential that an additional nuclear energy generating plant be constructed at Montrose, New York, as soon as possible. This project is most urgent to enable this Company to fulfill its obligation to supply adequate electric power to meet the demands of the consuming public.

As you are aware, we already have acquired a number of parcels of property adjoining your property at Montrose and the acquisition of your parcel is required to provide the necessary site for the proposed generating plant.

In the course of discussions with you, we have offered to pay a fair and reasonable price to purchase your property but, as yet, this offer has not been accepted. In addition, we have proposed to acquire for you several suitable sites as a substitute for your property, but these offers, too, have not been acceptable to you.

Under the circumstances, I must advise you that unless mutually acceptable terms for our acquisition of your property are agreed upon on or before July 1, 1968, we shall have no alternative but to take the necessary steps to acquire the subject property by the institution of condemnation proceedings.

In light of our cordial relationship in the past, we are reluctant to pursue our legal remedy of condemnation unless it is absolutely necessary and would, therefore, urge that you make every serious effort to consummate the conveyance of your property to us in an amicable manner for a fair and reasonable consideration before July 1, 1968. We are available to meet with you for further discussions at any time.
